Readings for the First Sunday of Advent

Isaiah 64.1-9 and Mark 13.24-37

Thought for the Day by Phil Hall

For most of us, particularly children, Advent is a time of great expectation as we eagerly look forward to celebrating Nativity, the Christian festival of Christ's birth. Christian theology considers Advent Sunday as the first of four Sundays, in the first season of the church's liturgical year. In Christian culture Advent - adopted from Latin adventus "coming, arrival" - signifies the expectant waiting of the Nativity of Christ at Christmas, along with preparation for the return of Christ at the Second Coming. Uniquely, in the sequence of the four Sundays in Advent, the first Sunday is

simply referred to as 'Advent Sunday' whereas the other three Sundays are considered 2nd, 3rd and 4th Sunday in Advent, respectively.

And yet the two readings for Advent Sunday, Isaiah 64. 1-9 and Mark 13. 24-37 start off suggesting something entirely different; something unexpected; something to think about. Both readings paint a different, but similar picture of 'the heavens' warning all of us, in vivid, descriptive words, about the Son of Man coming with great power and glory.

Isaiah 64.1 uses the words "...rend the heavens and come down that the mountains would tremble before you!". Mark 13. 24/25 prefers "...The sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, the stars will fall from the skies and the heavenly bodies will be shaken". It is as if each reading depicts a picture of pending doom and gloom.

In my view they do not; they simply portray a scenario, a warning of what will happen if we do not look for, listen to, and follow, Christ's example. At Mark 13. 27 an unexpected 'beam of light' appears out of all this gloom, reassuring us all of the wonder of following Christ. "...And he will send his angels and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of the heavens...". This small, poignant section particularly caught my eye because I know it is true, absolutely true.

I feel sure that many of us believe in Heaven, in some form or other, but how many of us have actual seen Heaven? I have; and Advent, particularly early Advent always, but always, brings that bitter-sweet memory to mind.

I am one of the very, very lucky people on earth who has seen and can recall, with beautiful, vivid clarity, the wonderful glory of Heaven. It was not just a passing view of Heaven from a jet window but a wonderful, glorious, eyes-open-wide, never-to-miss spectacle of something almost too beautiful and too simple to describe.

It was one evening, early December 1955, that I noticed a gentle, white mist in the corner of my bedroom; the bedroom I had shared with Derek, my 13 year old brother. Derek had died from Asian flu on the morning of the 5th December 1955, just a few days earlier.

As this white mist gradually enveloped me, I saw two beautiful, tall angels, with long, slender wings standing at the bottom of the stairway. The stairway swept upwards and right towards Heaven. Between the two angels was Derek with both his hands holding the angels, one in each hand. He was in his grey school uniform; short trousers, woolly pullover and socks down round his ankles. It was as if they were all waiting for me to arrive and see them standing there before, without even looking back, they all set off up the staircase. I watched them for what seemed a long, long time until, sweeping gracefully to the right, they entered Heaven. It seemed like an eternity before the staircase faded away, the mist gradually dispersed and I was alone in my bedroom.

It was absolutely amazing, so beautiful and so wonderful to have witnessed. I did not feel frightened or lonely; in fact I felt so happy that Derek was no longer suffering and was now going up to Heaven. I just lay there on my bed, staring into the mist until it disappeared completely and I fell asleep. Although I recall clearly the first snow of winter - the day after Derek was buried - I have no recollection of Christmas 1955, less than two weeks later, nor Christmas in any form, for many, many years after that vision, it did not change my belief in Christ one iota.

With hindsight I believe it was a calling for me to put my faith in Christ and that I have; a faith which has and will continue to guide me through my darkest moments. I am constantly aware of Christ's presence in and around me - even though I do question it at times - and with that wonderful, warm feeling of a contented life, how can I not look forward with great happiness and joyful expectation to celebrating a wonderful, happy Christmas amongst my many fellow Christians and other friends.
